
Art Exhibition

A History of Stafford

Felix De Zoysa loved the prestige of his precious school being located in the heart of Colombo 7. A leading businessman, he decided to open Stafford Ladies College in 1959, after previously launching Stafford College in Maradana.

On its opening day, 13 fresh faced girls nervously entered Stafford Ladies College; or Tillingham House as it was alternately titled. A total of 300 students attended the school during its existence. They were taught by intellectual teachers in varied fields such as Art, Science, Home Science and Needlework, to mention a few. The very first Principal of Stafford Ladies was Mrs. Wincooke, a kindly figure who guided the girls towards being strong and independent individuals that would later thrive in the world. She served from the inception of the school until 1979, and thereafter was succeeded by one of the Vice Principals: Mrs. Noreen Welikala. Stafford Ladies was popularized for its high standards in the Sciences; a feat which the Vice Principal Mr. Ranjith Wijemanne was instrumental in achieving. Under his guidance, the school established one of the best Physics laboratories in the scholastic sphere.

The girls were given a well-rounded education at the school, with occasional games, matches, needle work and cake demonstrations. Art, home science and science exhibitions were also held during this time and it is in lieu of these exhibitions that the school continues to conduct the annual exhibition – Kaleidoscope. Some of the girls boarded at one of the two

hostels operated by the iconic Matron: Mrs. Soyza.

There was an umbrella of schools under the name 'Stafford', including the Stafford College for Boys (established in 1960) which was led by Mr. Ranjith Wijemanne. Similarly, Pembrooke Academy for Boys, located in Flower Road, was yet another initiative by Felix. The institute taught English Medium Science and was paralleled by the Commerce Stream at Alexandra Place.

When Mrs. Wincooke retired from her Principalship in 1979, she was succeeded by one of the Vice Principals - Mrs. Noreen Welikala , who was quoted by her staff to be a 'regal, eloquent and fashionably dressed individual'. She was an outstanding personage who possessed inordinate wisdom, fiery determination and a high intellect and is still greatly revered years after her retirement in 2009. One feature of interest is that until this time, students would go to India to sit for their exams until the Education Ministry provided permission for exams to take place in Sri Lanka. In 1985, a Commerce Section was introduced and Mrs. Welikala introduced uniforms for the O Level and A Level classes.

When the Ministry of Education decided to entertain the possibility of opening international schools, Stafford was one of the first schools to jump on the bandwagon and the school was then renamed Stafford International School in 1985 when it became a co-educational private levying institution geared to the British curriculum of studies, catering

to London O/Level and A/Level examinations. During the transition, Mrs. Welikala continued to be Principal of the school and thus became Stafford International School's first Principal. The school was the second international school in Sri Lanka.

Ever since then, Stafford International School has built itself a reputation as a forerunner in the field of education. It has been well-renowned for its exemplary academics and extracurriculars and regarded as one of the most prestigious schools in Sri Lanka. Even its Primary Section, established in 2003, with

the help of Mrs. Mangalika Gunawardene, is a credit to the school, with its modern learning methods and coherent teaching strategies.

We as students have been guided by our school's valuable teachings for a majority of our childhood.

Therefore, as Staffordians, we are proud to say that whatever life hurls at us, we will continue to 'strive towards the light'.



Ethos and Traditions

Stafford prides itself for the diverse cultural atmosphere created at the school. Our lavish and rich history of 60 years consists of several cultures and traditions. Religion, especially, is held in a very high respect and every learning day is inaugurated, with fifteen minutes dedicated towards religious observances. Accordingly, religious events such as Saraswathi Pooja, Bakthi Gee or Carol Service are held annually and students of all backgrounds are encouraged to participate in these events, hindering the contribution to stereotypes in today's world.

In a society where racism currently plays a major role, Stafford has since the beginning brought up its students in an environment where discrimination of any form is severely prohibited. Students are taught in an environment where everyone is considered equal and friends are made disregarding facts like religion or even political ideals. At the school, bullying is simply not condoned in the slightest and thankfully, it is almost nonexistent.

Important figures of Stafford



Noreen Welikala

Mrs Noreen Welikala was well known in Stafford for her reputable position as the former principal but most importantly for being a part of the evolution of Stafford and establishing it into the school it is today.

Mrs Welikala pursued her tertiary- level education and graduated from the University of Peradeniya; one of the most prestigious universities in Sri Lanka. She started her career as a teacher in Stafford Ladies College and was later appointed as the vice principal. Mrs Welikala was a wife, mother but most importantly a woman who understood the mindset of children and was compassionate towards people. She became the first principal of the co-educational Stafford International school when it was created in 1987. With the assistance of Mrs Kalyani De Zoysa, Mrs Welikala enforced strict discipline, introduced the house system along with the school logo and song. After several years of serving Stafford, she retired in 2009.

She was respectful, altruistic, eloquent, affable, well dressed and above all she had a heart of gold.

As a teacher and principal but most loved as a human, Mrs Noreen Welikala was truly one of a kind.



Felix De Zoysa

Although there are many key figures when it comes to the History of Stafford, Mr Felix De Zoysa is the beginning. If it were not for him, the story of Stafford would never have been awakened and told among generations of Staffordians. As a young boy, Mr Felix as the adored son led a very carefree life. He was treated with the utmost care. An excerpt from Mrs Noreen Welikala's book 'The life story of a successful businessman' showcases the turning point in Mr Felix De Zoysa's life:

"Felix remained disinterested in his studies. He did not apply himself to his work. He did however, put in some last minute cramming, which naturally did not help him. All in all Felix made poor progress on the academic side. Studies and he were poles apart. His father who naturally expected his son to shine at College was disappointed. He left Nalanda College and joined Pembroke Academy. He now realized that he had fallen short of his father's expectations. It dawned on him that he should have done better for himself. This was a turning point in his life.

Life went on in fashion until his father fell ill. His father's brother was put in charge of the press (The day Mr Felix was born, his father bought a printing press and installed it in Maradana. It was named 'Felix Press') and Felix himself gathered knowledge about how a press works. He became interested in doing business on his own. He had learnt of ups and downs in the business world, monetary and otherwise. He learnt about competition, business rivalry, demand and supply and management of labour and so on. Slowly but surely Felix's business acumen came into the limelight."

Mr De Zoysa, despite the several challenges he faced as a young businessman, is now the founder and former chairman of Stafford International school, Stafford Motor Company, The Dolphin Hotel, Felix Press, Felix Printers and Atlas Hall in Sri Lanka. In 1950, Mr De Zoysa married a quiet pretty lady by the name of Ruby Samarasekera. Mr and Mrs De Zoysa had three daughters. Simplicity was the key note of his lifestyle. He was a fond father, not very emotional and never indulged his children, the way he was indulged by his parents. His children were clearly made to understand that money could not be plucked from trees or that one could not get it for mere asking. Mr Felix De Zoysa was a man of great benevolence. He had helped countless numbers of people in various ways and kept it all a dead secret. Money did not

change Mr De Zoysa neither did it change his way of life. The more money he had, the more he stressed simplicity. Mrs Noreen Welikala in her book 'The life story of a successful business man' said it best:

"Felix in the twilight of his life could have the satisfaction of having done the best. His favourite words of advice were -"Whatever you do, do well" true enough as whatever he did, he did to the best of his ability."

A few years before Mr De Zoysa's death, he was commended for an act that one in a million may do. The newspapers carried a headline in the Daily News of the 25th of July 1979 'A man in a million shrugs off a million'. The Ceylon Daily News called him this as he had returned an overpayment of Rs 1.1 million to the Department of Government of Supplies on the sale of motorcycles. "Such was his honesty and integrity which a million words cannot describe. If one mentioned this to him, he would just smile as if the reference was not for him." says Mrs Welikala in her book.

We as a school body will forever be indebted to Mr Felix De Zoysa because above all, Stafford has become a second home to many students and has created an environment where each individual can excel and become the best person they could be, thanks to him.

Kalyani De Zoysa

The story of Mrs Kalyani De Zoysa is one of virtue and female empowerment, setting the stone for our female students to look up to for generations to come.

Mrs Kalyani De Zoysa entered the University of Ceylon in 1948 after passing her University Entrance Examination with flying colours. All of her family members were happy with her results but no one wanted to see her going to a university. However, her determination and resilience enabled her to break through the barrier between her and her education. In 1951, she completed the university education with a bachelor's degree in Arts and a diploma in English. Not only was Mrs Kalyani De Zoysa the deputy principal of Government Girls' College, Castle Street but she also aided her brother Mr Felix De Zoysa in running Stafford Ladies College and functioned as the Managing Director of the school. She was also instrumental in the inception of Stafford International School.

From the very inception, Stafford was best known for its exemplary academics. Mr Ranjith Wijemanne, the vice principal of Stafford Ladies College in 1959 was influential in attaining this achievement. One of the best physics labs was created during his time. Being a physics teacher at the start of his career, he made sure this was possible with his constant assistance and counsel. This reference came to origin when Mr De Zoysa realized that Mr Wijemanne was a good organizer and a soft hearted man with great ability.

Amarasiri Abeywardene

Mr Amarasiri Abeywardene ran the A Level Section of our school for 37 successful years. As a director, he mentioned that Stafford has received the best science results continuously since the inception of Stafford International School. It was Mr Abeywardene who made our school into an Examination Centre, until which students had to go to different schools to write their exams. Our utmost gratitude goes to Mr Amarasiri Abeywardene who was the reason for this significant transition.

Mangalika Gunawardene

Mrs Mangalika Gunawardene was significant in the formation of the primary section in the early 2000s. She aided both principals Mrs Welikala and Mrs Thaldena in managing the primary and secondary schools efficiently. Mrs Gunawardene is remembered for her warmth, kindness and understanding demeanor.

Winn Cooke

The very first Principal of Stafford Ladies was Mrs. Wincooke, a kindly figure who guided the girls towards being strong and independent individuals that would later thrive in the world. She served from the inception of the school until 1979, and thereafter was succeeded by one of the Vice Principals: Mrs. Noreen Welikala.



Sunethra Thaldena

Mrs Sunethra Thaldena was appointed as the principal of Stafford International School in 2009. During her tenure of 10 years, Mrs Thaldena brought about some important changes. She introduced the House System of Felix, Kalan, Noreen and Ruby named after key figures in our history. She was involved in the inception of the Western Band of SIS, Debating tournaments and our very own prefectship system. After serving Stafford as a principal for almost a decade, she retired.

Sectional Report

2019/20

The academic year 2019/ 2020 has been an unprecedented year in many ways.

The year began with many pleasant surprises when the Cambridge Award Winners list was published. The list showed that 28 students from Stafford International School had secured awards. Among the winners was Chaneth Senuja Wickramapala securing Top in the Word for AS Level Mathematics, and a record of six students securing Top in the Country.

March of 2020, saw us pushed into unchartered territories with the onset on the COVID 19 Global pandemic. With the closure of schools in accordance to government regulations, we realized that we would not be able to conduct classes as usual. The School Administration was determined to minimize the disruption to students, at least with their Academic work. The team took up the challenge to start the school third term as planned on the 23rd of April.

To be able to start school, our primary objective was to find a channel to broadcast the lessons where the teachers would be able to conduct the lessons from home. Additionally, we needed a platform to host the study materials which would be user friendly for the teacher as well as the student.

Then we faced the massive obstacle of ensuring the teachers were equipped to teach from home by providing them with laptops and internet connectivity. The purchase of these objects was organized despite the lockdown, but delivery of the items to each teacher's home became a problem due to the curfew imposed. This was further compounded by the fact that teachers were from three different districts – and

crossing a district was banned. With the commitment of our staff, we were able to obtain curfew passes and have all the equipment delivered and set up within a few days.

The next step was the training of the teachers, so that they would be able to learn and then thrive in the new environment. We wanted to ensure that no teacher would feel isolated during this time, and therefore we went through an extensive training module.

In the meantime, Edexcel and Cambridge Examinations were cancelled. The teachers had to provide predicted grades for all the subjects in Form V for the students who were to sit the Cambridge IGCSE exam and The Lower VI and Upper VI which was to sit for their Advanced Subsidiary and Advanced Level examinations respectively.

However, I must also focus on the activities prior to March 2020. Primarily among this were the walk, fair and exhibition organized as Stafford International School Stafford celebrated 60 years since its inception in 2020. The student extracurricular activities such as the Kaleidoscope exhibition was successfully conducted.

Some of the main student activities also concluded were:

- The Annual sports meet which was held as The Sugathadasa Indoor stadium.
- The Annual swimming meet.
- The Annual cricket encounter.
- A Blood donation campaign.
- Health camp for over 800 people conducted in Ratmalana.
- Beach cleanup project.
- Distribution of books for the needy.
- Annual under-12 badminton tournament conducted by the school for all the international schools who are members of The International Schools of Sri Lanka (TISSL).
- The Annual Debating Tournament.



Sectional Report

2019/20

It gives me great pleasure to write a few words as the Vice Principal of the Middle School at Stafford International School (SIS).

The year 2019/20 has been an eventful and challenging academic year for SIS. The Annual Sports Meet and the Christmas Carols were successfully completed during the 1st term followed by the Founder's Day which commemorated the 60th Anniversary of the SIS. This was a highly successful event as we had an array of activities such as a stage drama "A Doll's House" organized by the Drama Club which was a great success; an Art exhibition, a Cake Exhibition presented by the students from Form 1-3 and the "Walk and the Fair organized by the Interact Club of SIS in February 2020.

Then came the global pandemic Covid 19 in mid-March which put a stop to all school's activities and events planned for the last three weeks of the 2nd term and the entire 3rd term. This resulted in cancelling all written examinations including O/Ls, A's Level and A2 level by the main exam bodies; Cambridge and Edexcel. In lieu of the cancellations, the examination bodies offered couple of alternatives for the students, either to withdraw from the examination and sit in the next available exam session or accept the predicted results. This caused some students to withdraw from May 2020 and sit for May 2021 examinations, whereas the remaining students opted to accept the predicted results.

In order to curtail the spread of the virus, the Govt had to lockdown the country from mid-March to mid-June and physical attendance was banned in all schools in the country. As an alternative solution most schools including SIS adapted online lessons. The classes were conducted for all subjects

through Zoom and Edmodo for the entire third term. This was overwhelmingly successful exceeding all expectations. Even though this method was new to both the teachers and the students, both parties embraced this system with excellent success. Not only the lessons were conducted online but also we participated in an online competition to commemorate the World Environment Day and won places too. Hence, this will give new thoughts to have blended learning in the future.

Nothing could have been possible if not for the great support extended by the management throughout this difficult period counselling and inspiring the teachers, students and parents and leading from the forefront to bring the situation under control to keep the ball rolling.

Last but not the least, as the saying goes, there is a silver lining in every dark cloud, we see the light at the end of the tunnel as govt has indicated on plans to reopen the schools in mid July 2020. We eagerly await for this to become a reality and to get back to our normal lives again. May our country and the school be blessed by all religious faiths to prosper again and to stand strong against all odds!!!

I am petrified. I don't like these dark corners or those long hallways, knowing they're there, waiting for their prey; me. I try my best to please them all, but how am I supposed to finish the homework of three "friends" by tomorrow? The teachers are no better, always giving me extra work because I'm the 'troublemaker'.

School: School is the temple of education; supposed to be where I learn, where I thrive, where I feel safe; but it's not. It can also be the kingdom of shadows that hides everything. The white paint covers up the damaged, broken walls of pain, bruises, and cuts
They say I act like a girl; what's wrong in being a

girl? Girls are strong too... stronger than me. And then I hear their voices, "Well hello there Kushal. It's nice to see you again."

Welcome to the newest episode of Kushal the punching bag. My head bangs against the table making my brain finally function to think- why do they resort to destruction, to harm, to pain, to violence?

I don't care if I don't have friends, I don't care if I don't have good grades, I don't care if I'm a failure because I don't want to go to the place I dread; school.

BLACK PAWN MOVES A SQUARE FORWARD

Don't give in to your fears Maya! Stand up to them and stand up to Mr. Fernando! "Well, well, if it isn't the troublemaker herself. I hope you've learned your lesson from yesterday and did your extra homework." "Yes, Mr. Fernando" with all my pep-talk that's all I said. I've had enough; people that were my friends, turn on me because I stood up to 'certain' people. They either joined in or were too scared to say anything, all because I said

no. Isn't it okay to say no? All I did was to stand up for myself.

Is it because I didn't want to be like Rashmi? Pushed down to the floor, called all sorts of names, humiliated and disgraced, all because Senadi's 'ex-boyfriend' went out with her. And now I'm the next toy. I said no and I'm deserted because I'm 'worthless' and 'boring'. Should I accept everything with a smile and do as they say?

What are we to the world, pawns for them to play within their sick games?

White Pawn and Black Pawn are in front of each other.

Kushal and Maya are two white pawns, the victims – unlike you and I, who do not fear walking down the corridors of our schools and find the school a peaceful and positive place. For those two, school is a prison with shadows of violence hidden deep within its walls, like black pawns. We should stand up to break down those walls of pain and make school a safe place for all. It could start with something as simple as noticing their pains.

Turn your messages and thoughts into action.

1. MAKE SOMEONE SMILE TODAY

We're too caught up in our little bubbles; worried about what to wear, because we didn't go shopping, or how to get the newest phone. Therefore, we're oblivious to reality. I've taken many things for granted, and have not appreciated the things I had – a loving family, a safe place to live, a school, and friends until I met with a group of girls who have none

of these.

Meeting the girls at a Child Development
Center changed my life. These girls have faced
violence, sometimes in the hands of a family
member, facing pain and even sexual abuse.
They don't have a safe home, a proper school,
or loved ones protecting them. They made me
realize how petty the things I worry about are.
Being popular or becoming first in class is not
as important as being safe and happy. We all
must learn to count our blessings and spend

our energy on positive things. I believe it would be great if everyone could get an opportunity to "see the other side" with guidance on how we could use our energy for a positive cause to make someone smile.

- » Schools could have regular "see the other side" sessions and create opportunities for children to use their energy for a positive cause - to make someone smile.
- » Develop Roleplay sessions/dramas on how to say NO!
- » Media platforms could be used/made for awareness programs.

2. It's Cool to Say NO to Bullies

To become popular, at times we may turn a blind eye to bullies and their victims. To become popular, we get into gangs or cliques doing things we may regret. But, if you knew the suffering, or if you were the victim, wouldn't you want someone to step up and say a big fat NO?

Wouldn't it be amazing to see others stand up beside you as you face your 'fear'? Wouldn't you feel happy to know that there wouldn't be any more victims? Therefore, stand together and say the most difficult word to say; NO!

» Schools should have an anonymous box for victims or observers to put the violent incidents for the school officials to put an

- end to it.
- » A nurse/counselor could help the students gain more confidence and get over their trauma, helping them to say NO.

3. #NoToViolence

Be more observant. We're mostly caught up in our own dramas to look at the rest of the world from a different angle. We believe that the world revolves around us and that the ones suffering are just seeking attention. But the reality is another thing.

Be vigilant, reaching out and raising alarm to the things we think are strange. Be brave enough to do it, because you're not helping your university CV, but someone else's life. It's perfectly alright to stand up to what you believe in and to do it alone.

- » A club could be formed where senior students could be observant of certain behaviors of students and report it to the nurse/counselor in charge.
- » Students should be taught from early stages about the effects of violence when committing and suffering from it.
- * #NoToViolence should become an important aspect in the daily school life where students can post pictures using the hashtag on the schools/clubs' social media accounts showing its presence to other



It was mostly because of Stafford's welcoming and amiable environment. Everyone I met was so friendly. The management was so supportive and the teachers were amazing, helping me settle. The children I met accepted me into their world and treated me like I'd always been there, making me feel the same way. I can no longer imagine a life without the friends I've made here. We all believe in the kind of friendship that I had been looking for my whole life.

It was an innate feeling of coming home and finding the people who truly understood me that I've felt in the few months I've been here. I consider myself truly lucky to be here.

So, Thank you. Thank you, Stafford, for changing my life. I consider myself to be fortunate to be striving towards the light under your name. I know that there's no other place I'd rather be.

Heart Transplants

Heart transplant aren't easy to get. There are around 3,500 heart transplants being done every year, of which more than half is in the US. Sri Lanka's first heart transplant was done in 2017 in Kandy. Transplants are only done if absolutely necessary. It is done on end-stage heart failure patients and for patients who suffer from severe coronary heart disease (more commonly known as heart attack), when all other medications have failed.

First of all, the correct anatomical position of the heart is not where your shirt pocket is, as commonly believe. It is between the lungs, above the diaphragm and under the sternum. There are two types of heart transplants. The

most common one being "orthotopic transplant" and the rare one being "heterotopic transplant".

Orthotopic heart transplant (OHT) is where the recipient's heart is exercised and the donor's heart is placed in the correct anatomical position. Here the donor's heart is brought in a special ice box from a hospital or the donor's body is brought into a neighbouring operating theatre. The recipient's heart is cut out, the inferior and superior vena cava, pulmonary vein and artery and the aorta are separated from the recipient heart. The donor's heart is inserted and all the veins and arteries are connected.

The second type of transplant, the heterotopic heart transplant (HHT) is where the recipient's heart isn't exercised. It is also called the "piggyback transplant", this is because it is similar to the donor's heart giving the recipient heart a piggyback ride. This surgery is very uncommon. The donor's heart is placed right to the recipient's heart. It is in case of severe acute rejection. The two heart are joined at the left atrium, where the oxygenated blood from the

pulmonary vein flows into the donor's heart. This surgery is becoming less frequent with advances in immunosuppression medication. In this surgery we can truly say that two hearts beat as one.

Heart transplant usually guarantee about 15 years of life post-surgery. Heart transplant is normally caused by an unhealthy life-style, so let's choose to live a healthy lifestyle and make sure we can keep our own heart with us until we die.





My love for baking started when I was at the age of 5, and as of now, I have done a lot of baking. Following are some of my goodies created over the years.









Sectional Report

2019/20

It has been my pleasure and delight to lead the Upper primary school as its Vice Principal this year.

The challenges posed by the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, has meant that we have had to change the way we cover the school curriculum for your children. To this end we have navigated the worlds of distance learning and remote engagement to chart a new course for children to be computer literate, resourceful, open minded, adaptable and discerning, and to really apply themselves into shaping their academic futures. A number of innovative study methods have ensured the smooth running of online classes to keep the students immersed in the learning process without interruption.

Nevertheless, I would like to focus on the highlights of the year gone by, particularly looking at students life pre-lock-down.

Curriculum: We at SIS have a strong scholastic tradition and have striven to be forward and outward looking to maintain a high level of academic excellence across a breadth of study. A key feature has been the importance placed on personalised attention tailored to the needs of children. We have also focused on developing independent learning techniques for the students, so that they may engage in educational activities at their own pace. 



The Last Standing Wonder of the Ancient World

A pyramid is a shape with triangular sides that join at an apex on the top. The shape of the pyramids themselves may have been designed to evoke the rays of the sun streaming between heaven and earth as historians believe that they were built for religious purpose as Egyptians were one of the first civilizations to believe in an afterlife. So, all the effort went into creating a grand tomb for the king who, as a mediator between the Gods and the people, was thought to be deserving of the finest of tombs.

The Great Pyramid is the oldest and the largest of the three pyramids in the Giza pyramid complex located in Modern Cairo, Egypt, and is believed to be built as the tomb for the Fourth Dynasty Pharaoh Khufu (Or Cheops).


Standing at 455 feet tall, the Great Pyramid covers 13.1 acres. It is estimated that 2.3 million stone blocks weighing between 2 and 15 tonnes each, were used to build this massive structure. It has taken approximately 20 years to complete the pyramid and several theories are debated by scholars as to how it was built and by whom. Some theories point to slave labour, some evidence and theories suggest that paid skilled workers worked tirelessly to build the Great Pyramid during the course of 20 years and there are also ideas that aliens built the pyramids. However, the way this pyramid was built constructed is a marvellous feat and should be awed and respected because it is still standing today with relatively minor damage.



Just like the other pyramids found in Egypt, the Great Pyramid itself is filled with internal passages and chambers. It would also have housed all the necessary goods for a fruitful journey to the afterlife, including a great deal of precious metals and stones, food and hand carved furnishings. But to the archaeologist's utter dismay, no mummies of grave goods have been found inside this great pyramid except for the rectangular granite sarcophagus in the king's chamber. Historians and archaeologists believe that the treasures in the Great Pyramid must have been robbed and looted after the end of the old kingdom.

Being the oldest of the seven wonders of the Ancient World and the only one to remain largely intact, the Great Pyramid of Giza is indeed one of the greatest creations found on Earth.

INGREDIENTS:


- Potatoes

Galileo di Vincenzo Bonaulti de Galilei was an Italian astronomer, physicist and engineer from Pisa. He was born on the 15th of, 1564, in Pisa, Italy. He died on the 8th of January, 1642 in Arcetri, Italy.

Galileo has been called the "father of observational astronomy", the "father of modern physics", the "father of the scientific method", and the "father of modern science".

The design Galileo Galilei used in 1609 to build a telescope is commonly called a Galilean telescope. A Galilean telescope results in a non-inverted and upright image, because the design has no intermediary focus.

In Galileo's telescope the objective lenses are convex and the eye lens is concave. Galileo knew that light from an object placed at a distance from a convex lens created an identical image on the opposite side of the lens.

Galileo turned his new, high powered telescope to the sky. In early 1610, he made the first in a remarkable series

of discoveries. He spent several weeks observing a set of stars near Jupiter as they relived around the planet. Here are some of his discoveries and creations.







Jean-Dominique was driving his son, Théophile, to the theatre one evening when he lost control of his body and his car slid off the road. Terrified, Théophile got out and ran for help. His father had suffered a stroke, which meant that blood hadn't been able to reach his brain.

Jean Dominique woke up twenty days later.

He could no longer move.

He could still think, hear and see, but he couldn't control any part of his body except for one eyelid.

It was a huge and upsetting shock.

Before the accident, he'd been the head editor of one of France's most Famous fashion magazines. He'd driven fast cars and eaten in fancy restaurants. He had a wife and two children that he loved. Now what would he do?

His therapist invented a system of communication. At first, it was blinking once for yes and twice for no, then it evolved so that he could spell out whole words and sentences.

Using just his one eyelid, Jean Dominique wrote an entire book called

The Diving Bell And the Butterfly. In the book, he explains that he struggled at first with his new physical condition, but eventually learned how to escape through adventures in his mind.

"My mind takes flight like a butterfly,"

he said. There is so much to do. You can wander off in space or in time, set out for Tierra Del Fuego or King Midas's court

The book was a bestseller, was made into a film, and prompted a lot of scientists to carry out more research on the condition, called locked in syndrome.

The competition finally ended at 1.30 p.m. I was truly happy with the response I received for my project.



Stafford Debating has grown leaps and bounds this year to establish themselves as one of the best teams in the Sri Lankan debating circuit. We've reached knockout rounds at every tournament this year, and also successfully hosted the 8th Felix R. De Zoysa Memorial Challenge Shield in February. However what we're most proud of, is the fact that throughout this year we've enjoyed ourselves, socialized and formed friendships with other schools, let go of our fears, and grown really close as a group, while simultaneously becoming better debaters.

At the N.M Perera Memorial Challenge Shield 2020 hosted by Ananda College, both Stafford teams outdid themselves. Stafford B comprising of Kaishoriy Bahlendran, Sinththuriy Bahlendran and Kashia Dias emerged quarterfinalists. Stafford A successfully reached the grand finale of the tournament, a feat that hasn't occurred since 2013. After an brilliantly thought-provoking yet entertaining debate, they were placed runners-up to Wesley A on a 4-1 split. The team comprised of Aqeel Fouzi, Humaid Saleem, Rishen Samaranayake and Jahan Cader. Humaid was also placed 10th out of over a 100 speakers at the same tournament.

At the Sri Lanka Schools Debating Championship organized by the Law Faculty of Colombo, Stafford A emerged octofinalists. Aqeel Fouzi was placed 9th out of over 300 speakers, while Humaid Saleem was placed 12th. This being the largest tournament in the island, meant that our juniors were exposed to the ever-important social aspect of the debating circuit. For example during lunch breaks, most debaters from various schools join in a quick round of cricket, or have a casual discussion over lunch. The environment this creates is extremely helpful as it allows our juniors to get rid of their fear of public speaking, and bond with the tight knit debating community.

As one of the more established societies at Stafford, every year we host the Felix R. De Zoysa Memorial Challenge Shield. This year we held the tournament for the 8th consecutive time in February 2020. From ensuring the tournament was run on time, to creating topics that really engaged schools during the debate, the entire society put in the time and effort to ensure the tournament was a success. The immense positive feedback we received from other schools meant the tournament continued to exceed everyones expectations this year as well.

With all of this exposure on offer to Staffordian debaters, we are proud to also acknowledge the personal achievements of our debaters.

This year, Ageel Fouzi and Humaid Saleem

have been selected for the Sri Lankan Debating National Pool. This is a pool of the best debaters in the country, from which the Sri Lankan team for the Word Schools Debating Championship 2021 will be selected. Additionally, Kashia Dias and Humaid have also been 2 of 6 selected by the Sri Lankan Debating Development Squad, where each of the 6 debaters are given intense personalised training and feedback. We wish them well, and hope to see Staffordian debaters reach international heights!




donated stationary to the Special needs home too.

With a spirit of love and steely determination, The Healthcare Society (HCS) was born.

Looking at Sri Lanka today, it is difficult to believe that our country was once a flourishing paradise. Gone is the strength and vitality that was so valuable to our ancestors; good health is for many individuals, a thing of the past – something only to be dreamt of. Our island is rife with disease, be they infectious or otherwise. Since the formation of the society, we have organized two blood donations

The society also helped color wash the Rathmalgahaweva Rural Hospital by donating Rs. 100,000 worth of paint followed by the donation of essential equipment to the Horowpothana Divisional Hospital worth over Rs. 200,000. The Society's next feat was the most challenging, which was the refurbishing of the Labour Unit of the Horowpothana Divisional Hospital. The project cost a mammoth total of over Rs. 1.8 million. After a massive fund collection campaign using money collection

cards and a six-a-side cricket tournament and musical carnival called Right to Left, the society achieved its target and is currently awaiting shipments of equipment from around the world. To this day we have been receiving letters from around the island with requests for financial and medical support. The Society continues vigorous planning procedures to facilitate these urgent requests.

Headed by eight school children and lead by our dedicated members, the heights that we can reach our unimaginable. Determination and love have driven us forward to this day, and will continue to do so in the future. As the youth of this nation, we will continue to fight against the dark cloud that has weakened our people mentally and physically. We will continue to push on to emerge victorious out of this storm. We invite you too to join the movement to lend a hand in the battle to retrieve what we have lost and to make Sri Lanka bloom again.
